STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

TIPS TO REDUCE STORMWATER POLLUTION THIS SPRING

Don't Over-Apply Fertilizer! Why?

Premature Plant Death

Over-application of synthetic or chemicals fertilizers can increase soil salinity and root burn in the long run, which may result in your plants not

being able to properly absorb water and nutrients in the soil, leading to their untimely demise. Overuse of synthetic fertilizer can also disrupt soil chemistry and actually do damage to soils.



Harmful to Aquatic Life and Humans



When excess fertilizer gets into our storm drain system and travels into our waterways and oceans, algae blooms can form resulting in a loss of oxygen in the water. Algae blooms pose a direct threat to aquatic animals, which need to breathe just like we do! A well-maintained, natural lawn care system requires

little to no fertilizer. Talk to your local garden center about how to care for your landscape and if you must fertilize, what products you can purchase that are organic and environmentally friendly.

Sweep, Don't Hose!

Sweep around your house and driveway vs. hosing to clean away the accumulated dirt and debris. When you sweep, pick up the debris and place it into the appropriate trash receptacle. Potentially impactful items and debris picked up and placed in the trash are less likely to get into the storm drain system and degrade water quality.

Take Your Car to A Car Wash

Spring is a great time for cleaning up inside and outside the home. However, when you spruce up your car, think of going to a local car wash vs. hosing it down at home. This actually saves water and reduces runoff to our waterways that contains soap and debris. A standard garden hose uses about 10 gallons per minute.



If you wash your car for 10 minutes, you might consume 100 gallons of water. While hosing with an automatic shut-off valve may save more water, it's still recommended to take your car to a commercial car wash that can properly dispose of harmful runoff (debris, oil, harmful soaps, etc.). Commercial car washes also have sophisticated reclamation systems that enable them to re-use water, so they only expend approximately 9-15 gallons of water during any given wash cycle.

Scoop Your Pet's Poop!



With warmer weather comes more walks with your fuzzy friend in the outdoors. Always remember to clean up after your pet's waste and place it in the trash. Pet waste contains harmful bacteria that will wash into our waterways after a rainfall-which there is plenty of in the spring!

Drain Swimming Pool Safely

If you have a pool, drain it only when a test kit does not detect chlorine levels. Whenever possible, drain your pool or spa into the sanitary sewer system, where it will be treated. Also, store pool and spa chemicals in a covered area to prevent leaks and spills to the stormwater system.

We are excited to share that our volunteer fire company has seen a significant increase in its membership this year, with new volunteers and residents stepping up to serve, bringing our active member count close to 30 individuals. Their dedication is irreplaceable as we respond to approximately 250 calls per year, ensuring the safety and well-being of our community.

Thanks to the new fire tax, we're making substantial upgrades to our equipment. We're currently replacing our 2012 pumper with a new 2022 Spartan Fire Engine and our 2002 Kenworth 3000-gallon water tanker with a new 2023 Kenworth 4000-gallon super water tanker, aligning with NFPA standards. In addition, we eagerly await the results of grant applications to replace our QRS/utility truck and brush truck. Furthermore, we have applied for a grant to upgrade all our hoses and nozzles, totaling approximately \$115,000. Should the hose grant be awarded, we'll need a 5% match of roughly \$5,750.00. While we continue to fundraise diligently to cover expenses and facilitate upgrades, we rely on your continued support. If you haven't already, we invite you to join us at our upcoming events for some family fun!

We are pleased to announce the implementation of the new fire tax within our community, aimed at securing the necessary resources for the maintenance and replacement of our fire truck apparatus. This tax is a crucial step in ensuring the safety and well-being of all residents in times of emergency. However, it's important to clarify that the fire tax does not cover all operational expenses of our volunteer fire company. Funds generated through this tax cannot be utilized for electricity, heating, supplies, firefighter gear, or other essential needs. Therefore, we rely heavily on your continued support through fundraisers and donations to cover these expenses and keep our operations running smoothly. Your generosity plays a vital role in sustaining our ability to serve the community effectively. Thank you for your ongoing support.

Fires are permissible Monday through Friday between sunrise and sunset and on Saturday from sunrise until 3:00 p.m. No garbage whatsoever, or rubber of any kind, shingles, oil-based products, or toxic or hazardous materials shall be burned at any time or any place. All fires must be attended at all times by at least one adult person. No burning shall be permitted after 6:00 p.m. prevailing time. No burning of any kind on Sundays and legal holidays. They wrap around equipment and can shut down an entire facility! They all go in the trash.



NO PLASTIC BAGS, FILM/ SHEETING & FLEXIBLE FILM PACKAGING

Take plastic bags back to local retailers to keep them out of the recycling stream. Visit **plasticfilmrecycling.org** to find a drop-off location near you.



NO PAPER NAPKINS, PLATES, CUPS & TISSUES

Compost if possible, and remember to recycle the cardboard tube.



NO POLYSTYRENE FOAM

Foam and plastic containers are not recyclable curbside. Find drop-off programs for items like foam packing peanuts at earth911.com.



NO TIRES, AUTO PARTS & SCRAP METAL

(Not in recycling or trash.) All can damage equipment and are safety hazards. Contact your local scrap recyclers or retail tire stores for recycling options, or check **earth911.com** for a dropoff center near you.



NO CONCRETE, WOOD & CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS

Can damage equipment & are safety hazards. You may be able to schedule a bulky item pickup - otherwise throw it in the trash or order a roll off bin by contacting Waste Management Customer Service.



NO YARD WASTE & WOOD

Compost or put in your yard waste cart, if available. Otherwise it belongs in the trash.



NO NON-RECYCLABLE PLASTIC

"Celebrating Katherine Di Febo"

Happy 90th Birthday!

Katherine Di Febo easily personifies this line by poet Adrienne Rich: "...those who age after age, perversely, and with no extraordinary power, reconstitute the world."

Katherine, is our *Deputy* tax collector! Who even knew we had one? Or that her official, unpaid position is required by state law?

Who knew that it is Katherine's hands that open all the taxpayer envelopes; sorts and organizes their contents; checks, stamps and dates receipts with check numbers; and makes sure that all things are current, correct and ready for the *elected* tax collector, her daughter, Regina Marinelli, to finish the process of recording the payments, making deposits, and so on.



Seated at her desk/office, otherwise known as the Di Febo family dining table, Deputy Katherine rapidly shuffles through a breadbox-size carton of tax bills, receipts, and checks, along with a few handwritten notes and cards. In between explaining this process, she offers a visitor tea and a handful of tiny pecan tassies served on a china plate. The tassies are homemade and delicious! Katherine steps away from her desk for a minute to see if two large and puffy loaves of panettone have risen and are now oven ready.

Not quite, she says. And she picks up where she left off about tax collecting.

Bottom line, Katherine is one of those folks poet Rich salutes. Those who work quietly, confidently and dependably behind the scenes to get the world's work done.

It's a huge plus that this deputy tax collector has an affinity for figures and a knack for numbers!

No surprise to learn that Katherine starts each day doing the newspaper Sudoku puzzle, a challenge for non-numbers people, and a headache for her daughter Regina.

Apparently, Katherine's never met a column of figures that she didn't like. And when numbers don't add up the way they should, Katherine keeps at it until they do. Sometimes she even finds answers in her sleep. Like the time an answer came to her in a dream explaining the reason why a calculation was off by ninety dollars!

Homer Haring, Katherine's father and a timekeeper for Alpha Cement Company, recognized and encouraged his daughter's gift for working with numbers. He even gave her some tips, like *Transposition Error*. She might not have known the term, but she saw how it worked.

The Harings got a telephone and then a TV in the mid to late 40's. "All my friends would come to my house to watch", she says. "Nobody else had it." Katherine recounts all of this in the dining room of the house where she was born on April 17, 1934. Hers was a home delivery, not uncommon then, and in her grandma's home. She would grow up across the street, less than 50 yards away, where her parents, Homer and Zelda lived and raised Katherine and her two older siblings, Arthur and Irene.

A generation later, Katherine, married to Bill Di Febo, would raise their four children---Richard, Raymond, Regina and Rosemarie-- in the same house that was her birthplace.

If the elders could see their homestead now, they might not recognize "The Compound". Resembling a setting plucked from somewhere in the Mediterranean and plopped down on the main street of Martins Creek, it includes the original family home, a former butcher shop once operated by Katherine's grandfather, now converted to a home, a third home, a backyard pool, awning-shaded veranda, carefully-tended lawn and trees, and artful arrangements of window boxes and planters.

Katherine cont'd.

As Bill (Katherine calls him "Billy") tells the story, on their first date, a meal at the Turnabout Diner in Phillipsburg, she ordered two cheeseburgers, French fries, pie a la mode and hot chocolate. Something about that---her decisiveness, perhaps---made him like her right away.

A few more dates and they said their "I do's" on May 19th, 70 years ago.

These and other numbers mark important milestones in Katherine's life, and in those of kinfolk in her various roles of daughter, sister, student, wife, mother, aunt, grandma, and caregiver to aged parents.

As a bookkeeper for three different local blouse factories, and then a postal clerk for 20 years, on her feet 8 hours a day (one of three women and ninety men), Katherine was a standout using paper and pencil before the emergence of computers. Younger clerks, sometimes "didn't know how to make change" she says, citing one particular example with a laugh, "I had to teach him."

Then there are the people and places in LMBT that she has served over decades, behind the scenes, "balancing people's checkbooks," she says, as financial secretary of the Three Church Hill Cemetery Board and the Hunter- Martin Settlement Museum.
